Spring is right around the corner! We have a lot of exciting and fun filled events approaching as we progress through the remainder of the school year.

The M-STEP is replacing the MEAP. Students will be tested in the areas of English Language Arts, Mathematics, and Science. Students will be assessed next month and the test will be given online. In preparation for the assessment we have been going to the computer lab on Wednesday afternoons to familiarize ourselves with the online tools that will be available for students to use during testing. We have also been identifying testing vocabulary and strategies as we are completing some of the online practice tests. More information will be shared as the new state assessment approaches.

Stuck in the Book Nook This week new guided reading groups will begin now that winter reading levels have been assessed. We will begin new books while continuing to use important reading strategies to strengthen overall reading comprehension! Some reading strategies to reinforce at home include asking questions, making connections, visualizing, and inferring. We will continue to focus on reading nonfiction books, which is a great reinforcement for the nonfiction reading that students are doing for their research/biography projects. Please know that the end of the year reading target is a level R.

This week students will begin giving book talks! Book talks are similar to television commercials. Students are to present a short two minute minitalk that advertises a "just right" book that they have read. The goal is to entice their classmates without giving away surprising parts. Students are to practice their book talk ahead of time and they are allowed to write out what they want to say. For two weeks I modeled how to give a great book talk and I provided students with clear and specific expectations. Please ask your Cougar about their book talk and encourage your Cougar to practice ahead of time.  $\odot$ 

As a class we are currently reading, the award-winning book <u>The Watsons</u> go to <u>Birmingham-1963</u> by Michigan based author Christopher Paul Curtis. This is one of my favorite books that I always enjoy reading with students. The book is full of humor and some real life situations that many families and children encounter. Please ask your child to tell you a little about the "Weird Watsons" if he or she has not done so already!

Please encourage your child to read "just right" fiction and nonfiction books at home and at school. All students are required to read for at least **20 minutes** each night.

This is the last month for the Pizza Hut Book-It Program! Our Pizza Hut Book-It Reading Goal for this month is 450 minutes! Please encourage your child to track their nightly reading on the Reading Calendar! We have a few students who have participated each month since October and they will be recognized next month! ©

Additionally, to celebrate MARCH IS READING MONTH all Cougars have a calendar with different activities to complete this month. After completing four activities in a week, please initial your Cougar's calendar and have them return it to school to be checked by Mrs. Burau or Ms. Kelly-Sell for a special prize! At the end of the month students can bring in their completed calendar and enter to win the GRAND PRIZE!

The Pencil Is Mightier Hopefully your Cougar has been buzzing about the African American they are researching for their research/biography writing project! We began this project by first reviewing the characteristics of biographies. To practice the skill of note taking while reading a published biography, our class read the book The Real McCoy: The Life of an African American Inventor written by Wendy Towle and illustrated by Wil Clay. For the last two weeks in lieu of our weekly reading response letters, students have been reading their biographies and taking notes to learn about their subject's early life, childhood, family, education, interests, talents, achievements, and obstacles. With the help of Mrs. Burau students have also been using reliable online resources during their media center time to research their subject!


In the coming weeks, during our writing workshop time we will use our notes to practice writing topic sentences, drafting body paragraphs, writing strong introductions and powerful conclusions for our biographies. Students will also spend time in class using an editing and revising checklist to self-revise and proofread their drafts before publishing their final drafts.

In our Everyday Math curriculum we have completed unit 6, and we have started Unit 7: Fractions and Their Uses. The Unit 7 Family Letter was sent home last week. Some of the concepts and skills that will be taught include: locating fractions on a number line, comparing fractions, ordering fractions including improper fractions and mixed numbers, using models to explain why equivalent fractions are equal, writing improper fractions as mixed and whole numbers, and adding and subtracting fractions with like and unlike denominators.

Prior to beginning unit 7 students spent time completing math re-assessments. Students were re-assessed on math concepts and skills from Unit 1-Unit 5 in which he or she was not yet secure. Essentially, I wanted to give students the opportunity to show all areas in which they may have progressed since their first math assessments. You will see this reflected on the math portion of the report card for the winter marking period.

I strongly encourage families to utilize everdaymathonline.com. Each student has been provided his or her login information and password. I have taped this information inside of their Homework Folder. The directions were included in your Curriculum Night Parent Folder on how to access eSuite on everydaymathonline.com. Students can practice their fact fluency, play math games, and access the student reference book to assist with homework. In addition, there are online animations that model how to use math algorithms taught in the math curriculum.




In social studies we have completed our study of the Southeast region, and have began learning about our very own region, the Midwest.
